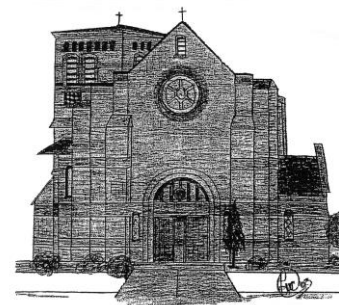

Lenten Devotional Opportunities

The Penitential *Exhortation* contained in the *Book of Common Prayer* invites the Church,

to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance, by prayer, fasting, and self-denial, and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word.

Please take note therefore, of the following educational programmes and spiritual practices on offer during the Lenten season.

Lenten Reading. A selection of books on prayer is on display in the parish hall. Do browse, and please remember to sign out any borrowed books.

Lenten Daily Devotional Booklets. We Bow Our Hearts to You by Ed Arle are now available at the back of the Church.

Through Lent with Luke. Listening to the third Gospel with Father David Rath on **Wednesdays**, starting **March 13th**, at **7:00 pm** in the church library.

To Decline from Sin and incline to Virtue: The Seven Deadly Sins. Join Brian Wehrle on **Sundays** after High Mass for an eclectic look at virtue and vice. "Walk in the Spirit... crucify the flesh with its passions and desires." (Gal 5:16,24)

The Stations of the Cross will be prayed every **Friday** in Lent at **7:00 p.m.** Journey with our Lord along the Via Dolorosa and meditate on the path to salvation, accompanied by organ.

Confession. Take the opportunity to avail yourself of the sacrament of reconciliation and be shriven. Please speak to a member of the clergy to schedule an appointment.

Daily Office/Mass. Consider taking on some extra devotional practices this Lent by attending the weekday offices and masses at St. Barnabas.

Lenten Mission with Sr Elizabeth Ann Eckert SSJD will be held on the weekend of **April 6th, & 7th**. She will be speaking on the topic of prayer.

Baptism and Confirmation

The *Exhortation* indicates that,

This season of Lent provided also a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for holy Baptism.

Any children or those such as are of riper years seeking **Baptism, Confirmation, or Reaffirmation**, should duly consider making preparations for these vital Sacraments of Initiation, as **Bishop Baycroft** will be visiting the parish in **May**. Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving: The Three Marks of Lent

Prayer is good with fasting and alms and righteousness. A little with righteousness is better than much with unrighteousness. It is better to give alms than to lay up gold...

- Tobit 12:8

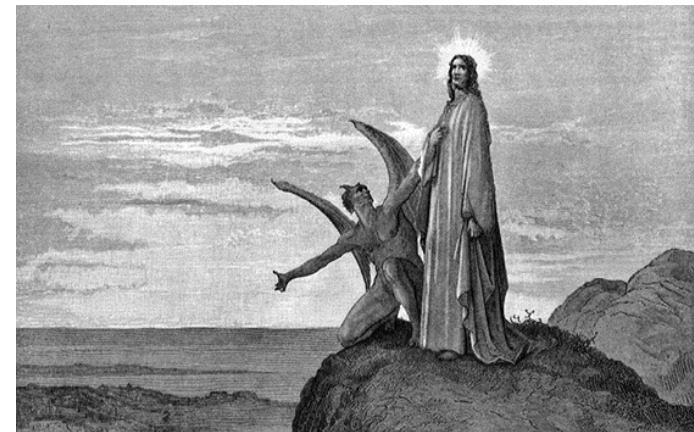
The *Book of Common Prayer* (p. xiii) decrees two **Major Fast Days** of the Church year: *Ash Wednesday* and *Good Friday*. The custom is to have only one light meal in the evening, health permitting. The *BCP* also directs that all Fridays of the year (except Christmas Day and the Epiphany) and the Forty Days of Lent are days of abstinence. Traditionally, this meant that meat was to be avoided, hence the custom of eating Fish on Fridays (which in Quebec includes **beaver**, and in New Orleans, **alligator**). This was done in remembrance of the Passion and death of Jesus on Good Friday. The Orthodox Church, following ancient practice, continues to observe Wednesday as a day of abstinence, as this was the day in which our Lord was betrayed. The recent health trend of intermittent fasting underscores the psychosomatic quality of fasting; what benefits the soul, also benefits the body.

The Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after the First Sunday in Lent are *Ember Days*, which are **Days of Solemn Prayer** that appear four times in the Church calendar, demarcating the four seasons. Their purpose, besides the general one intended by all prayer and fasting, is to thank God for the gifts of nature, to teach us to make use of them in moderation, and to assist those in need. A selection of books on prayer has been made available through the parish library for the Lenten season, and in April, Sr Elizabeth Ann Eckert SSJD will be speaking on the topic of prayer.

Almsgiving in Lent has been closely connected to fasting, as it was expected that any money saved from fasting and abstinence would be given to the poor.

Give almes of thy goods, and turn never thy face from any poor man, and then the face of the Lord shall not be turned away from thee.
