Christian Education at St. Barnabas

Christian Virtue: An Advent Talk-and-Discussion Series

Peter Scotchmer, a parishioner and retired English teacher and department head, is prepared to offer a series of one-hour talk-and-discussion lectures on several Christian Virtues as these make their presence felt in a number of significant literary works listed below, from which a selection will be made. It is proposed to offer these at 9:30 each Sunday morning during Advent before the 10:30 High Mass on the following topics: **Temperance** (Scott Fitzgerald's The Great Gatsby) **Diligence** (John Bunvan's Pilgrim's Progress) Love (William Shakespeare's King Lear) Prudence (William Golding's Lord of the Flies) **Chastity** (Edith Wharton's Ethan Frome) **Faith** (Shusaku Endo's Silence) Patience (Jane Austen's Persuasion) While it is helpful for participants to have read each work in advance, no prior knowledge of each is assumed. Interest is the sole requirement. Please sign up on the sheet provided at the back of the church.

*O tempora! O mores!** – The Time(s) in which We Live

A glance at the bulletin or a hymn board might beg the question: what season is it at St. Barnabas? For much of the year *ordinary time* is measured both by Sundays after Pentecost *and* Sundays after Trinity, hence the reason why there exists a discrepancy in the numbering systems. Ordinary Time is derived from the Latin, *ordinalis*, which refers to numbers in a series, and stems from *ordo*, from which we get the English word 'order'. In the liturgical calendar there are two seasons of Ordinary Time: Epiphanytide and Trinitytide. The first begins after Christmas and ends with Lent. The second begins after Eastertide and Pentecost with Trinity Sunday, and continues throughout summer and autumn until Advent. By the design and grace of God, we live most of our lives in ordinary time, learning to walk by the Spirit that has so graciously been poured out upon us. "If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit." (Gal5: 25)

The liturgical reforms of the past century introduced a three-year lectionary, replacing the one-year lectionary, which is retained in the Prayer Book tradition. Thus parishioners at 8:30am follow the one-year cycle, which counts Sundays after *Trinity*, whilst at the 10:30am mass, the three-year cycle is followed, which counts Sundays after *Pentecost*. Although considerably more scripture is covered in the new lectionary, it lacks the thematic harmony of the one-year cycle in which the collects synthesize the Epistle and Gospel readings (the collects have been reordered as well in the new lectionary – gone is *Stir-up Sunday*). To make matters more confusing, although North America generally counts Sundays after Pentecost, the Church of England retains Trinitytide, and provides the option of extending Christmastide to Candlemas, thereby swallowing up Epiphanytide (an excuse to keep the tree up and drink eggnog until Feb. 2). The annual cycle of the Church's year comes to a close next Sunday, with the Feast of Christ the King/Sunday next before Advent. * *with apologies to Cicero*.
